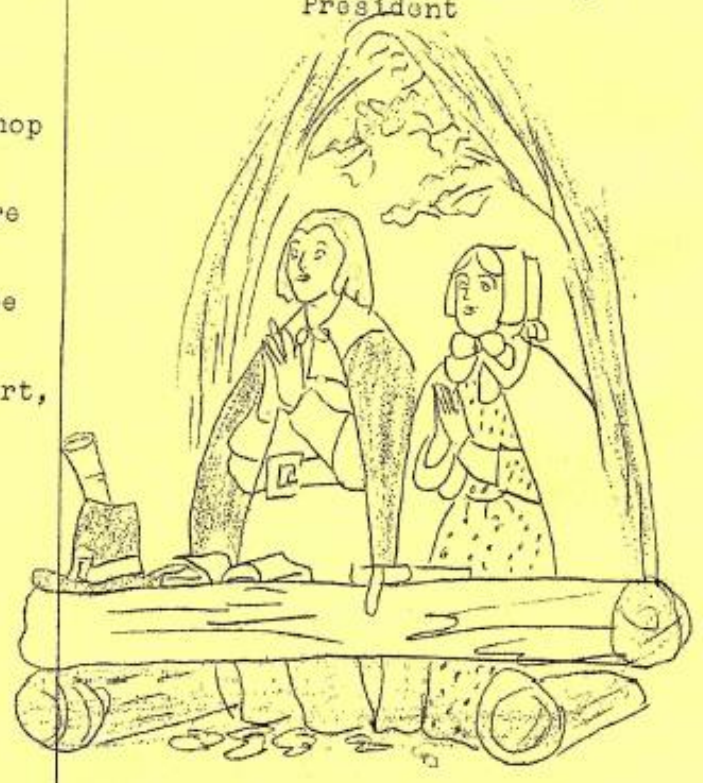

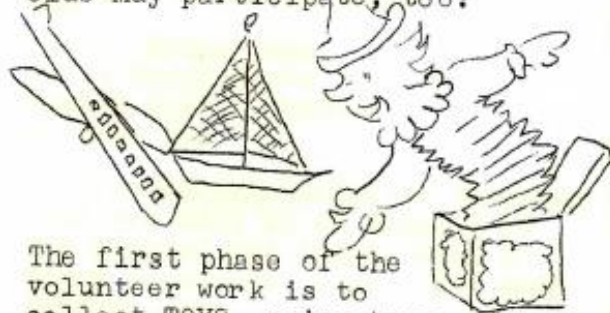
IT'S CARD PARTY TIME!

Cincinnati University.

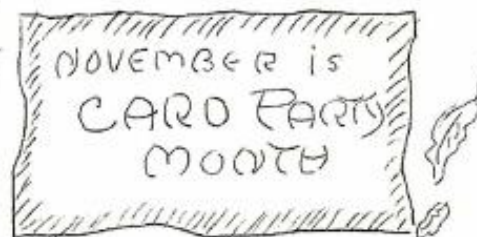
