Just back from Florida are JEAN and BOB KREWSON and the girls.

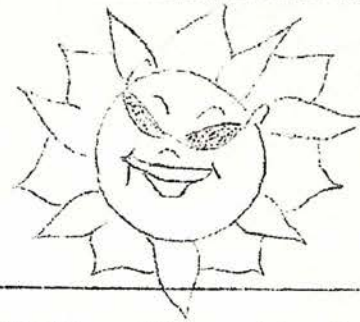
NANCY and PHIL WOLF enjoyed Easter in Fort Lauderdale.

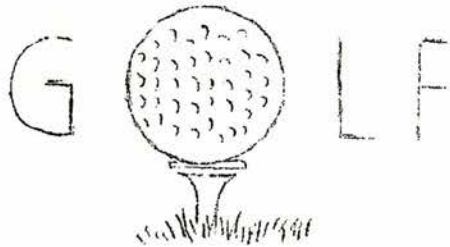

Monday, May 16, at 8 P.M., there will be a meeting for the entire Welfare committee membership at Nita Pack's -- 21114 Westwood Rd. Everyone is welcome to help plan next year's events.

At this meeting the date for the next trip to Apple Creek will be decided upon. If any of the men would like to accompany the group to Apple Creek, the patients seem to enjoy their visits very much.

Monday, May 9, between 30 and 35 of the cast of "John's Other Life" went to the Cleveland Psychiatric Hospital to present the play in the new auditorium to approximately 130 patients, plus the staff members on duty. The scenery for the presentation was limited to chairs and the stage, but this did not detract from the performances of Don Campbell, Maynard Elliott, Jim Judd, Universe Krist, and the other members of the cast. The prologue, opening scenes, and most of the dancing scenes were given. Florence Fisher, along with her other duties, was accompanist.

Open House was held for the cast members in the ward we sponsor, following the production. Punch and cookies was served, and the evening was enjoyed by all.

A group will be going to Cleveland Psychiatric throughout the Summer, on the scheduled first Monday of every month. The July program will be a picnic away from the hospital grounds.

July 27th and August 3rd, both Wednesdays, are the days on which the Service Committee will be going to the Society for Crippled Children. The girls should plan on being away from home between 9 and 12 in the morning. Mothers cannot bring their own children as each one will be working directly with one of the crippled children.

A small picnic lunch, enough for yourself and the child with whom you will be working, consisting of the following, should be packed:

- Peanut butter and jelly, egg salad, or meat sandwich (cut in quarters)
- Carrot strips
- Cupcake or cookies
- Fruit.
