WELFARE'S WAY Jean Gero

The Welfare Committee under the leadership of Helen Ashton, has planned a full and interesting schedule for this year. Welfare will again sponsor activities concerned with mental health in two of our institutions...

City Hospital One committee group, headed by Norma Calladay, will work at City Hospital with a ward of psychotic boys, ages 16 to 19. This program is scheduled for the first Monday evening of each month. The entertainment may include games, cards, square dancing, etc. Plans remain flexible to permit the boys to join in scheduling activities they will most enjoy.

Refreshments are served by this group and are looked forward to greatly by the patients.

Apple Creek The other project, under the supervision of Mita Locke, is a program of entertainment for 100 mentally-retarded men, ages 18 to 30, hospitalized at Apple Creek. Four dates have been set: October 9, December 3, February 11, April 15, and a fifth party has been tentatively scheduled for May.

Each party has a seasonal theme and offers a variety of simple, colorful games with prizes awarded, and, of course, home-made refreshments.

Each baking and telephoning are required for the success of these parties, and volunteers are urgently needed. Interested club members may contact Nancy Gehlke at BEgent 4-2593.

Service Committee A third group, working under Kay Dunk, is the Service Committee. Their object is to aid the mental health groups through the use of their creative talents. This group meets once a month in one another's homes to sew, make place mats, wrap gifts, etc.

The Welfare Committee hopes that all members will avail themselves of the opportunity to go on at least one of these trips to City Hospital or Apple Creek. They feel that the experience will afford valuable insight into mental health problems and stimulate enthusiasm for this program.

The Civic Committee has its finger in all of these pies, and many more, and would like to introduce a few of them to you right now.

Our volunteer work for the Cleveland Speech and Hearing Center continues all year, and consists of helping both the Center on the East Side and also the Center on the West Side at Fairview Park Hospital. We create what the Center calls "art therapy material"--booklets, pictures, puppets, games, etc., any thing which the therapists need as visual aids in their teaching. Much of this is done at the committee meetings, and the best part about it is you don't need to be artistically talented; if you can cut and paste pictures, you can create therapy material. Of course, we can use you artists, too!

Speech classes for children will start on Saturday, October 1. There will be four classes this year -- two for beginning students, and two for the advanced students who participated in the classes last year. Those who were signed up last year or whose names were on the waiting list will be contacted this week, and there will be an opportunity for anyone else to sign up at the Club meeting on Monday night or call Pat Seeger, Regent 4-3403. Vacancies will be filled on a first-come-first-serve basis, as they become available. Dates will be announced Monday night.

A donation of \$50 will be sent by the Civic Committee in the name of the Fairview Park Junior Women's Club to the Kiwanis Committee which has announced plans to raise \$12,000 for the purchase and equipping of an ambulance for the City of Fairview Park.

The Fairview Park Blood Bank, which is available to every resident of the city, is operated under the sponsorship of the Junior Women's Club and the Civic Committee, and has as its very able Chairman, Donna Newman. Delores Vetrovsky, Pat Campbell and Pat Mack will be assisting Donna.

Last year the Committee gave \$60 to the Library for the purchase of children's books. This year we will again contact the Library as to their needs, and will contribute a sum of money to help fill these needs.

Other projects were discussed at our first meeting last Monday night, and new suggestions are always welcome. Our meetings are held on the second Monday night of each month, in members' homes.

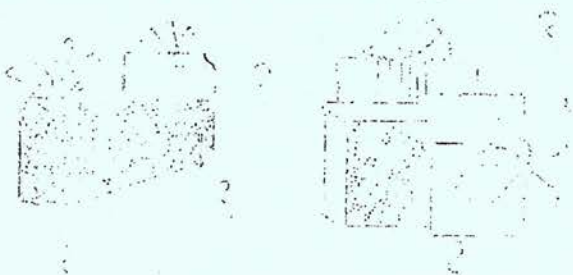
