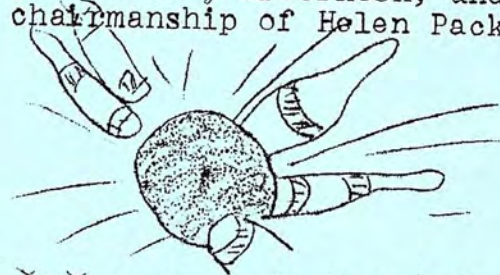

The Civic Committee is happy to report that almost one hundred Golden Books were brought to the December meeting. The Committee will still be glad to receive more books and toys.

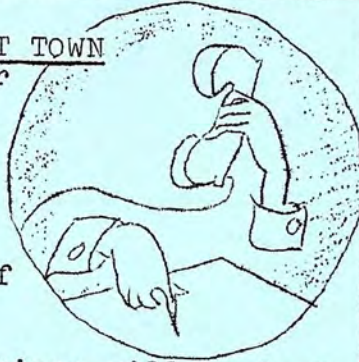
Several C.C. members attended the monthly Volunteer meeting at the Hearing and Speech Center on January 8. The group delivered completed therapy material and Golden Books.

MARY EVERETT, PEG SANKEY and JEAN SPALL have been appointed to the Board of Trustee for the Combined Health Drive.

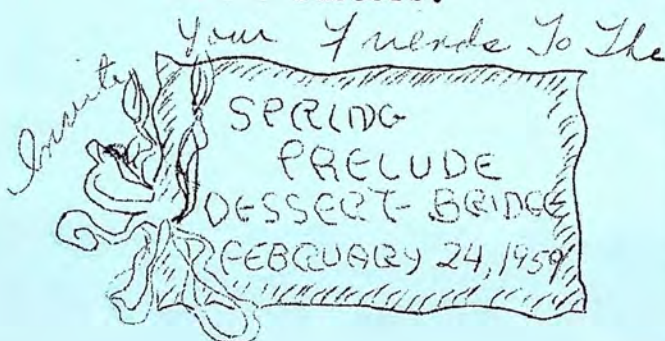

With bowling, golf and riding a sports-minded gal is she. Becky is the baby, Kim and Bonnie make it three.

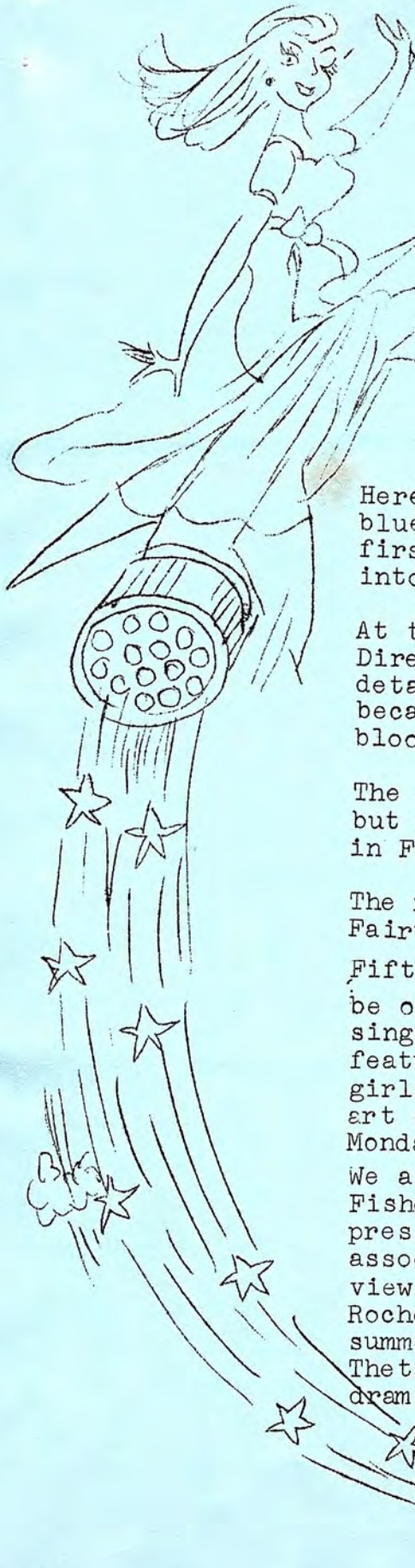
DOROTHY PALASCAK
