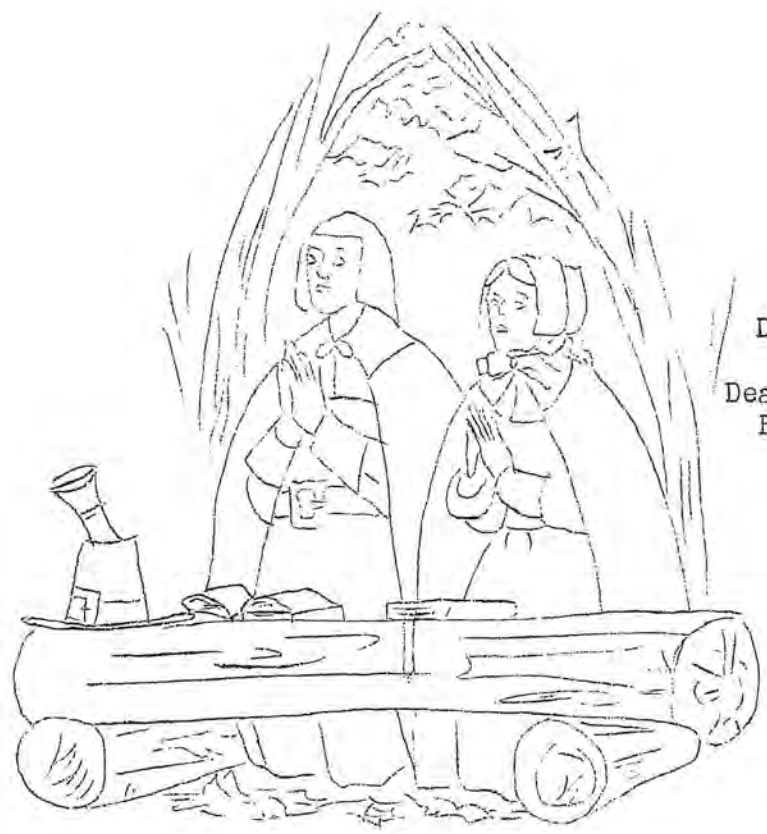

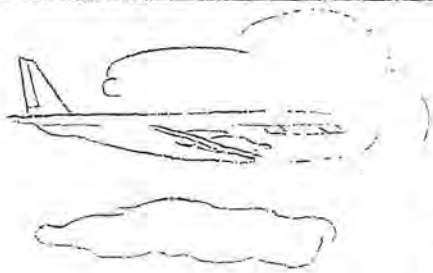

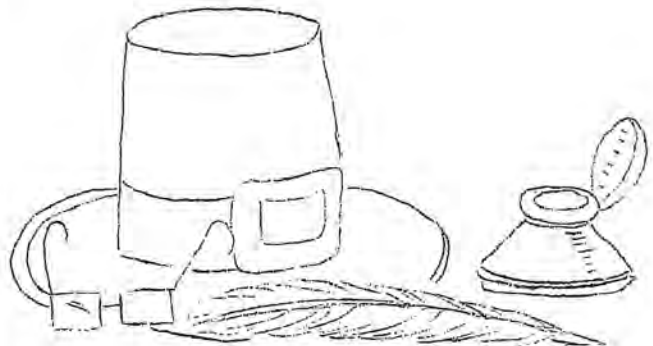
THE TIME IS NOW!!!

Welfare's Ways (cont.)

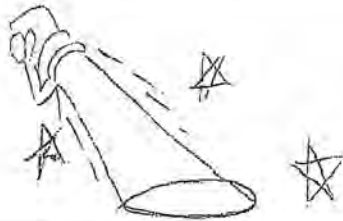
