Harriett Beekman, devoted supporter of troops, veterans, dies at 101

Longtime Fairview Park resident Harriett Beekman, 101, a devoted supporter of troops and veterans, died from respiratory failure Sept. 23.

"My mother was always active," said Beekman's daughter, Flo Gepperth, a North Royalton resident. "She lived in her own house until she was 101. She's just always doing stuff."

"She believed in supporting the people in the armed forces and respecting veterans for their sacrifice. She just really believed that there should be wider support and admiration for soldiers and veterans."

The Fairview Park-born Beekman will be remembered by many as the founder of the "We Do Care" program, which was created to extend love and moral support to troops serving in Vietnam by sending care packages and letters.

The half-century effort resulted in tens of thousands of care packages and letters being shipped to members of the armed services serving overseas.

In 1970, Beekman, when she wasn't working as a Higbee's telephone operator at Westgate or leading a local Girl Scout troop, established the nation's first Vietnam War Memorial in the foyer of Fairview Park City Hall.

She also initiated the "God and Country" letter-writing campaign for local eighth-graders to demonstrate their patriotism and support of America's troops.

Gepperth said her mother's passion for soldiers and veterans began in the late 1960s when a family friend died in Vietnam.

It was through the "We Do Care" program that Berea native and Army Vietnam veteran Cliff Krasnosky first came in contact with Beekman.

"From a veteran's standpoint, she was a real patriot," Krasnosky said. "I met her initially when she sent me a package in 1968 in Vietnam. There were crackers, some cookies, candy, a toothbrush and toothpaste. It was the idea that you got a package from home."

The lifelong friendship continued right

up to her death.

"Very few people would have that feeling toward veterans and that kind of a commitment," Krasnosky said. "I called her mom. She was like our mother to the military."

"She was a very patriotic person. We respected that. If we had a function at the legion, I'd have her come up and do the pledge for us."

"She did the last pledge in June. Even at 101 years old, she enjoyed doing it. It was an honor for her. We appreciated the fact she'd come up and do that."

"We just saw her as a true friend of the military, of the veterans and, of course, of the country."

In addition to her children, Flo and Ernest, she is survived by four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

IN THE NEWS

Although FPWC wasn't mentioned in this article, the November 4, 2021 article in the Sun Post-Herald is included for historical purposes. Harriet will always be remembered as a Fairview Park treasure. She passed away on September 23, 2022 at age 101.

Harriet began the We Do Care program during the Viet Nam War, and the God and Country letter writing contest for 7th and 8th graders in 1976. Students from Lewis F. Mayer Middle School, St. Angela Merici School, and Messiah Lutheran School compete in this contest, writing why they think "God, Country, and the men and women who serve in our Armed Forces are important to our country's freedom." FPWC assisted with the essay judging in 2015 and 2016, and assumed handling of the contest in 2017.

Stop in at City Hall sometime to see the beautiful We Do Care Memorial, which was updated this year with a plaque from FPWC and the Youth Association.

Service ensures car seat is installed right

Judy Hartwig wants her baby, due next month, to be safe in the family car. She pulled into the Olmsted Falls fire station bay last Thursday to learn the proper way to install her infant/child car seat.

"I'm pregnant with our first child," said the Olmsted Falls resident. "We purchased a new car and a new child car seat to keep our baby safe. I want to be sure I know how to correctly put the seat in our car."

Certified technicians with University Hospitals Rainbow Babies & Children's Hospital at St. John Medical Center now offer this free service — Community Fitting Stations — at various west-side suburban fire stations.

Olmsted Falls firefighter-paramedic Ty Bromund said residents look to the department for this type of service. "We get about one or two calls a week," he said. "You really need someone who is certified to install them properly. We use this service because they are very well trained and it is much more cost-effective."

That is where University Hospitals Rainbow Babies & Children's Hospital's Child Passenger Safety technicians come into play. These nationally certified experts receive special training and help parents, grandparents or caregivers in selecting a car seat appropriate for a child's age/weight and check for proper seat installation.

Technicians now will be scheduled at some area fire stations each month. A list appears below.

Take a look at the child car seat market and, well, your head will spin. Styles, sizes, colors — and prices — vary. However, you need to ensure the car seat complies with federal safety standards. Look for the various labels on the seat that state it is U.S. approved. There are counterfeit car seats — ones that do not meet U.S. federal safety standards.

Heidi Dolan, child passenger safety program coordinator with Rainbow Babies & Children's Hospital, said of car seats lacking federal approval: "They will not hold up in a crash and not protect a child."

According to the hospital's website, there are more than a dozen manufacturers that produce over 60 models of safety

Heidi also said always buy new.

"Check the seat to see when they were made and when they expire. They are usually dated to last six to 10 years. Materials do deteriorate over time," she said. "Buy new. You do not know how it was cared for, if harsh cleaning products were used on it or if it was in a crash."

She also said make sure the car seat fits your infant/child's weight and height as well as the model of your car. "A child should fit properly in the seat," she said. "... Some styles will not fit properly in your car. They may be too high, wide or small."

Heidi said parents, grandparents and other caregivers make common mistakes with children's car seats. They include: the seat, once installed, moves more than one inch in any direction; the chest clip is either too high or too low; the harness is too loose; youngsters are removed too early from their rear-facing position to a front-facing one; and parents place their children too early in a booster seat where the straps are designed for adults.

Heidi provided a car seat checklist, which is available on the hospital's website, tinyurl.com/2p9y3neh. The list includes:

- ▶ Check the label to ensure it is appropriate for your child's age, weight and height.
 - ▶ Keep children riding in the back seat until they are 13.
 - ▶ Children should remain facing the rear until they reach the highest height or weight the manufacturer states. Many are 2 or older when that occurs. Once they are in a front-facing car seat, adjust the harness straps and attach the top tether after you tighten and lock the car seat or lower attachments after making the change.
 - ▶ Once the seat is installed, shake it to ensure it doesn't move more than an inch.
 - ▶ Make sure the harness is tightly buckled and coming from the correct slots. With the chest clip placed at armpit level, pinch the straps at your child's shoulder. If you can pinch material there, the straps are too loose. Tighten them.
- Three other tips — children and infants should not wear their winter coats/snow suits in their car seats. If they do, they are at risk of coming loose from their car seat.

The district's family and community engagement coordinator worked with community organizations such as the Fairview Park Women's Club and school organizations such as the Mosaic Club, Key Club and cheerleaders to sponsor the families.

"The assistant principal at Gilles-Sweet Elementary was at Home Depot and purchased the trees we were able to donate to them."

Sullivan said the best part of it all is the messages and looks on the families' faces

when they come to pick up the gifts.

Dan Rajkovich, communications and marketing coordinator for the district, said that in districts where he worked previously, these types of projects were mostly individual efforts.

"It's nice that the kids get involved in something like this," Rajkovich said. "Especially with the cheerleaders and Key Club and Mosaic Club and Student Council who get together to make this positive change."

Historical tidbit: Since International Women's Day was observed on March 8, it seems appropriate to borrow this bit of local history, courtesy of local historian Chris Gerrett, author of "Tracing Fairview Park History."

Gerrett said that 73 years ago, a small group of ladies started inquiring how many women would be interested in forming a women's club.

"An overwhelming response in favor was received. Soon after, a women's club planning committee was formed. They held their first committee meeting in September 1948, quickly followed by their first executive meeting," Gerrett said. And that was just the beginning, she added.

The Fairview Park Women's Club had its first meeting in December 1948 in the Community Cabin (now known as Bain Cabin). There were more than 300 members, Gerrett reported.

The club established various departments such as the Citizenship Department, which focused on current events, national, state, and city projects, and discussion groups; the Educational Department, which focused on embracing literature, scholarship, nature study, conservation, world affairs, radio, and motion pictures; the Fine Arts Department, which provided an outlet for music, art, drama, and handicraft; and the Welfare Department, which devoted its efforts to community service, volunteer work and a hospital board.

"A special bond was shared among the members. The founders believed Fairview Park Women's Club would play a vital role in developing and strengthening the community. They were right," Gerrett said.

The club is still going strong. Those interested in learning more or joining the Fairview Park Women's Club should email FairviewParkWC@gmail.com.

The club annually awards college scholarships to high school seniors who live in Fairview Park and the Marion Cook Education Grants to women age 21 or older who live in Fairview to assist them with vocational or college studies.
